State demographics in Kansas consist of a population of 6% Black and African American citizens. Fall 2024 demographics of the KU School of Engineering include 3% Black and African American students. We are committed to raising that 3% to at least the state demographic.

Scholarship support will help the School of Engineering recruit more students, provide tuition support, student support services, involve students in research, and help them excel in rigorous engineering programs. This scholarship support will also broaden the students' point of view by enabling them to participate in extramural activities and fully engage in the campus community.

DR. HOGAN'S LEGACY

In 1970, SCoRMEBE, The Student Council for Recruiting, Motivating, and Educating Black Engineers was established at the KU School of Engineering by three African American students and three KU faculty and administration members.

In 1971, the School of Engineering appointed Dr. William Hogan as the school's first assistant dean

of minority affairs. With Hogan at the helm, SCoRMEBE grew, and minority engineering enrollment increased dramatically. In 1977, SCoRMEBE was named one of the four best minority engineering programs in the country by the committee on Minorities in Engineering of the National Research Council.
